### **Environment Projects**

Last summer we told you about our successful application to East Coast Community Fund (ECCF) to raise awareness of two important environmental sites in the village, *Victoria Park* and *Laceby Beck*, our rare chalk stream.

Since then we have held a successful and informative Family Fun Day with the help of Rachel, NEL Ecology Officer. We have also placed a seat in the park with a space for prams or mobility aids and purchased two information boards which will be erected on the site by March this year.

We are pleased to be able to report that N.E.Lincs. Neighbourhood Services will be preparing the site and providing wildflower seeds to begin create Laceby's own Wildflower Meadow.

The seeds have to been sown at a certain time of the year so, please come along and spend a hour of your time to help scatter the seeds on *14th March. Meeting Victoria Park at 3.30 to begin by 3.45.* 

With 97% of British Wildflower Meadows disappearing since the 1930's we will be doing our part to provide a natural habitat to support our threatened, but im-

portant wildlife for this and future generations of Laceby residents to enjoy.

Work continues at the Beck with the Duke of Edinburgh Team coming along twice a year to help maintain the area. In 2018 the group erected a bench and bug hotel. They also helped to

plant snowdrops, aconites and other wild flowers providing a welcome spring show. British Bluebells will be added in 2019

preparing the site for the summer, any help will be much appreciated. We will be erecting an information board researched and designed by the *1st Laceby Guides*. In

2018 the guides took photographs of the seasonal floral changes at the beck area and used these records to design the boards.

Children from *Stanford School* are working on a similar project relating to small creatures supported by the beck environment.

# Solar Farm Funding.

This spring and summer Laceby in Bloom will be busy replacing the original wooden planters made from recycled pallets with new purpose built ones. The new planters have been purchased with the help of the Laceby Solar Farm Community Fund and are stronger, more ornate and incorporate water reservoirs.

The wooded planters donated, by *Graham Davis Commercials*, have served us well. Without them, it would have been impossible to make such a beautiful colourful impact in the fist two years of Laceby in Bloom.

for continuing to provide floral displays through the winter months.

We have been given a few small free standing containers, wall troughs, a wheelbarrow, and even a couple of stone kitchen sinks.

So, should any business or resident like to plant them for your premises or area please

North East Lincolnshire Council is to cut the grass more regularly this year and will be completing rounds every two to three weeks - up from every four to five weeks the past couple of years.

The mowers will be out from March/April when the weather allows, cutting their way through 2,938,000 square metres of grass – that's the same as 73,450 average size gardens.

As well as more frequent grass cutting, the council will be planting more wildflowers on grassed areas and verges across the area.
